

SUSTAINABILITY IN THE GAP Newsletter 9—Waste reduction

COMMUNITY SEMINAR SERIES

Our September event started with a report by <u>Climate Action 4061</u> on their <u>plastic free July</u> initiative followed by two funny international videos that reflected on the topic of recycling and concern for the planet in two very different ways.

Then Federal Assistant Minister Trevor Evans spoke about some massive achievements: the national <u>Waste Plan</u> and <u>National Plastic Plan</u> that together aim to significantly reduce the amount of waste Australia produces, and to increase the recycling and reuse of materials. For example, by 2025, all packaging in Australia should be reusable, recyclable, or compostable. The <u>Australasian Recycling Label</u> (ARL) Program is also well underway. ARL labels can be found on more products, providing easy-to-understand instructions for consumers about how to correctly dispose of every part of a product's packaging. In addition to these already established plans he also spoke about ongoing work to <u>reduce the use of polystyrene</u> (the white material used in packaging) by the end of 2022. There is now also a Food Waste for <u>Healthy Soils Fund</u>



and an electronic <u>waste reduction scheme</u>. The questions from the audience were challenging, ranging from how to recycle complex everyday materials such as mixed plastics and food waste, to the question why the use and production of plastics should not be completely prohibited given the massive environmental impact of such products. While Minister Evans answered these questions well, it's likely a <u>combined effort of consumers, industry and politics</u> that will achieve the greatest and most rapid change. While recycling was at the forefront of the evening, MP Evans stated that the waste policy aligns with the premise of "refuse, reduce, reuse, recycle" and that recycling should be the last resort.

Our next seminar is planned for Wednesday **13th October, 7.30pm** with our topic: <u>Backburning: Friend</u> <u>or Foe?</u> Our speaker will be Mr David Kingdon, who has a Forestry background, and extensive experience working for State governments (Forestry and QPWS), local govt, private consultancy, and recently with First Nations people in SE Queensland. His career has been focussed on fire and pest management, and he will tell us about his views on fire and its role in keeping the bush healthy.

Our last event of the year will then be a barbeque get together on **Sunday 21st November**, 9.30am – 12.30pm where we hope you can join us for some fun activities and a relaxed conversation about the achievements of The Gap Sustainability Initiative in its first year and our plans for 2022.
